Turkish President Meets Counterparts at Economic Cooperation Organization Summit in Azerbaijan

The Turkish president has attended the 17th ECO Summit in Azerbaijan's Karabakh region, reaffirming Türkiye's commitment to regional economic and political cooperation



Turkish President Recep Erdoğan has arrived in Azerbaijan to participate in the 17th Summit of the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO), a key regional forum aimed at enhancing economic ties among member states. He is accompanied by several high-level Turkish officials, including Trade Minister Prof Dr Ömer Bolat.

Erdoğan gave a speech at the summit, where leaders from the 10-member ECO bloc discussed strengthening cooperation in trade, energy, transport, and other key sectors.

First Freight Trains from China to Türkiye Depart via Middle Corridor

2 trains carrying 2,000 metric tons of cargo each depart Chongqing, Chengdu en route to Europe through Türkiye



Two freight trains departed China for Türkiye on July 9, marking the first direct rail shipment under a new regular service connecting the cities of Chongqing and Chengdu with Europe via the Middle Corridor, the Turkish Transport and Infrastructure Ministry said. Uraloğlu added the launch represented a "new era" in the East–West logistics chain, adding: "These trains are the physical manifestations of Türkiye's vision for logistics on the Middle Corridor."

The route will continue through Central Asia and the Caspian Sea, entering Türkiye before reaching European destinations. Uraloğlu said the agreement enabling the service — signed between Turkish firm Pasifik Eurasia and China's State Railway during the Global Transport Corridors Forum held in Istanbul from June 27 to 29 — reinforced Türkiye's role in the Europe—Asia logistics network. He said Türkiye had invested nearly \$300 billion in transport and communication infrastructure over the past 23 years. The country's railway network has expanded by 3,000 kilometers (1,864 miles) to reach 13,919 kilometers (8,649 miles), including 2,251 kilometers (1,399 miles) of high-speed rail. "Our national railway network will ensure these trains reach Europe uninterruptedly," he said.

Turkish-Owned Merchant Fleet Ranks 11th Worldwide

Green transformation and sustainable development of Turkish maritime sector under way with national maritime safety in mind



Türkiye will secure a spot among the top 10 countries in maritime trade worldwide with its domestic merchant fleet, Turkish Minister of Transport and Infrastructure Abdulkadir Uraloğlu told the press. Uraloğlu said Türkiye is strategically located on important transport corridors and is a peninsula with its own sovereignty over its territorial waters since July 1, 1926, when the Cabotage Law came into effect

"Shipping is not only the backbone of global trade and the lifeblood of the global economy, but also it is a profession," he said, noting that the ministry is confident in the success of Turkish seafarers and the country's maritime industry. He emphasized that work is underway to support the green transformation and the sustainable development of Türkiye's maritime sector in innovation, technology and education. Uraloğlu noted that the ministry is working towards ensuring national maritime safety and security with high-standard services. "We implemented significant regulations for the development of the maritime sector over 23 years, with increased inspections, real-time monitoring systems, better shipbuilding capabilities and maritime structures on our coasts," he said. He noted that maritime safety is important not only for the maritime sector but also for global food security and energy supply.

Uraloğlu highlighted that Türkiye stands at the center of the global maritime system with the Turkish Straits, namely the Canakkale and Istanbul straits, connecting Asia and Europe. "Our straits host over 40,000 vessels per year, and some 9,351 vessels passed through the Istanbul Strait in the first three months of the year with 141.1 million metric tons of cargo onboard, while the Canakkale Strait saw 10,652 ships pass with 225.5 million metric tons of cargo," he said. "We updated the 'gold franc' value used to calculate fees to uninterruptedly pass through our straits, raising the rate by 15% to \$5.83," he added.

Uraloğlu said that Türkiye's merchant fleet ranks 11th in the world in tonnage, with over 2,150 vessels and around 51.9 million deadweight tons of capacity.

He noted that Türkiye's 85 active shipyards provide jobs for 94,000 people and the Turkish-owned merchant fleet. He said the 4th Türkiye Maritime Summit was held in Istanbul to discuss current events in the maritime sector, innovative ships for decarbonization, financing in maritime affairs, the impact of global developments, new approaches to port state control, and opportunities in cruise tourism. "The goal of this event is to gather domestic and international participants to strengthen the knowhow and the experience among sector stakeholders, create cooperation networks, and enhance the global competitiveness of the maritime sector," he said.

Turkish Foreign Minister Calls for Stronger Ties with ASEAN Amid Global Challenges

Ankara ready to support ASEAN's 2045 vision for resilience and inclusivity, says Hakan Fidan



Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan called for deeper cooperation with the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), citing shared challenges and strategic interests between Türkiye and the Asia-Pacific bloc.

"Türkiye stands ready to support ASEAN's 2045 vision for a resilient, inclusive, and sustainable community," he said.

The Turkish foreign minister also reaffirmed his country's commitment to strengthening ties under all three pillars of the ASEAN Community and called for support to elevate Türkiye's status to a full dialogue partner. Speaking at the 7th Türkiye-ASEAN Trilateral Meeting on Sectoral Dialogue Partnership in Kuala Lumpur, Fidan said the gathering offered a "timely opportunity" to assess the current state of relations and reflect on common goals. "The Asia-Pacific region stands at a critical crossroads," he said, pointing to ongoing geopolitical tensions, economic volatility and environmental disruptions. "Security perceptions have changed as a result of great power competition."

Fidan underscored the importance of cooperation with ASEAN, describing both Türkiye and ASEAN as strategically located and economically significant actors in their respective regions. "ASEAN ranks among the world's top five largest economies and is a model of regional integration," he said. "Türkiye is the 17th largest economy globally and one of the fastest growing among OECD countries." Bilateral trade between Türkiye and ASEAN surpassed \$15.7 billion last year, according to Fidan, highlighting what he called the "scale of existing potential." Türkiye established institutional relations and signed the Treaty of Amity and Cooperation, one of ASEAN's founding documents, in 2010, before becoming a sectoral dialogue partner in 2017.

Recent years have seen a notable strengthening of ties, with the Practical Cooperation Areas document — serving as the action plan of the partnership — updated to cover the 2024–2028 period. Türkiye officially applied for full Dialogue Partnership status in 2024, the highest level of partnership available to non-regional countries. Through its "Asia Anew" initiative and presence in all 10 ASEAN member states via embassies, Türkiye aims to further deepen institutional and strategic engagement with the region.

Türkiye-Pakistan Cooperation Growing: Erdoğan

Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan meets Pakistani Premier Shehbaz Sharif on margins of Economic Cooperation Organization summit in Azerbaijan.



Efforts continue to deepen cooperation between Türkiye and Pakistan in various fields, particularly on trade and energy, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan said in his meeting with Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif in Azerbaijan.

The meeting came on the margins of a summit of the Economic Cooperation Organization (ECO) in the Azerbaijani city of Khankendi, during which they also discussed bilateral ties as well as regional and global issues.

The two leaders reaffirmed their determination to strengthen and advance relations between their countries across all key areas, according to statement from the Pakistani premier's office. They highlighted the need to enhance collaboration in crucial sectors such as trade, defence, energy, connectivity, and investment. Sharif also reiterated Pakistan's "unwavering commitment to working closely with Türkiye in advancing their shared goals of peace, stability, and sustainable development throughout the region."

Türkiye Looking at \$5b Trade Volume with Georgia: Trade Minister

As a result of the Free Trade Agreement put into effect by the two countries in 2008, our mutual trade has exceeded \$3.5 billion annually,' Prof Dr Ömer Bolat says



The Turkish trade minister said that Türkiye and Georgia want to achieve a \$5 billion bilateral trade volume, and the current volume exceeded \$3.5 billion. Bolat, along with Georgian Minister of Economy and Sustainable Development Mariam Kvrivishvili, opened the Türkiye-Georgia Business Forum in Tbilisi in cooperation with the Foreign Economic Relations Board (DEIK) and the Georgian Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

Bolat said Georgia has implemented important economic reforms in recent years. "These achievements of Georgia also make us, as Türkiye, happy and give hope for our common future," he said. Stating that Türkiye supports the territorial integrity and sovereignty of Georgia, Bolat emphasized that prosperity in friendly and brotherly countries is important for his country. He said economic relations between the two countries are progressing perfectly. "As a result of the Free Trade Agreement put into effect by the two countries in 2008, our mutual trade has exceeded \$3.5 billion annually," he said. Stating that Turkish businesspeople are active in Georgia, Bolat said, "Our contractors have undertaken 304 projects worth \$5.6 billion in Georgia so far."

Bolat added, Georgia is a strategic transit country on the Trans-Caspian route and serves as a bridge between Europe and Central Asia, together with Türkiye. Stating that cooperation provided in the fields of railway data exchange and facilitation of border crossings with the Baku-Tbilisi-Kars (BTK) Railway Data Exchange Agreement signed in 2022 directly affects the performance of the Middle Corridor.

Bolat said, "Türkiye-Georgia coordination is of great importance for the sustainability of the Middle Corridor." Kvrivishvili said Türkiye is Georgia's strategic partner. "Georgia and Türkiye are not only neighbors, but also two partner countries that cooperate intensively," she said. Kvirivishvili noted that there are strong trade and economic relations between the two countries and said, "This business forum is a clear example of the close cooperation between the two countries." Stating that Tbilisi has taken steps to attract foreign investments to Georgia, Kvirivishvili said the Georgian economy grew by an average of 9.7% annually from 2021 - 2024.

Türkiye, UK Conclude First Round of Free Trade Agreement Negotiations

Updated FTA to include new provisions for trade in agricultural products, services and investments as next round of talks to be held by end of 2025, Türkiye's Trade Ministry says



Türkiye and the UK "successfully" finished the first round of Free Trade Agreement (FTA) talks. "The strategic economic cooperation between Türkiye and the UK is gaining new and strong momentum," Prof Dr Ömer Bolat said. The statement noted thatin the negotiations held in Ankara with the high-level participation of the relevant institutions of both countries and reported to have been extremely productive, many critical topics were discussed in order to deepen the scope of the FTA.

The updated FTA will provide new mutual market openings in agricultural products, the statement said, adding that comprehensive provisions will be included to provide a mutually beneficial cooperation environment between the two countries regarding trade in services. "In this context, possible opportunities in the field of financial services, including Islamic finance, will be explored, and service sectors in which our country is competitive, such as health services and audiovisual services, will be considered." It said joint steps that can be taken to facilitate investments will be discussed, mutual recognition of geographically marked products will be ensured, and awareness-raising steps will be taken for SMEs. "Areas of cooperation on innovation, consumer protection and women's economic empowerment will be concretized. The sustainable development dimension of trade in environment and labor issues will be reflected and customs procedures will be simplified in traditional and digital channels within the scope of trade facilitation," it noted.

The statement stressed that the strong mutual will to complete the FTA as soon as possible in a way that will contribute to the prosperity of both countries was once again confirmed during the negotiations. It noted that the annual trade volume between the two countries reached \$22 billion in 2024 and that the UK is Türkiye's seventh-largest trading partner.

"The UK stands out as the second largest trading partner of Türkiye with a foreign trade surplus of \$8 billion. In this context, the UK market, with a population of 69 million, maintains its importance as a

strategic economic partner that supports employment in Türkiye while offering a strong demand for our products," the statement said. The next round of negotiations between Türkiye and the UK is expected to take place by the end of 2025, and the constructive and committed dialogue process paves the way for the conclusion of the FTA as a new generation agreement, it added.

Seven Pillars of Partnership: Türkiye and UAE Enter Era of Transformative Cooperation

The two nations have signed wide-ranging agreements that mark the dawn of a renewed regional alliance and bilateral ties.



In a forward-looking act of diplomacy, Türkiye and the United Arab Emirates (UAE) signed seven wide-ranging agreements during the inaugural session of the Türkiye—UAE High-Level Strategic Council during a summit in Ankara last week. The event, co-chaired by President Erdoğan and Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, marks a decisive shift in bilateral relations and heralds a new phase of regional cooperation.

In his remarks, President Erdoğan expressed his pleasure at hosting Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan and his delegation for this landmark first meeting of the Council. "As His Highness Sheikh Al Nahyan has also emphasised, we are strengthening our cooperation and solidarity across all fields and further consolidating our brotherly ties." From trade and infrastructure to defence, energy and advanced technology, relations have deepened markedly. Erdoğan added that the UAE has now become Türkiye's foremost trade partner in the Middle East. "Just three years ago, we were asking whether we could reach \$10 billion in trade volume," he said. "This year, we hope to surpass \$20 billion. Our medium-term target is \$40 billion, and with mutual commitment, I believe we will reach it."


In their bilateral talks, the two leaders discussed both regional challenges and the deepening of economic ties. "When I visited Abu Dhabi in 2023, we laid the foundations of our strategic partnership that has already begun to bear fruit across nearly every field," President Erdoğan said. The UAE President's visit, he says, was "one of the most striking examples of this renewed engagement," noting that the seven agreements serve as "strategic pillars for the region's shared future."

FAO Food Price Index up Slightly in June on Higher Meat, Dairy and Vegetable Oil Prices

The FAO Food Price Index* (FFPI) averaged 128.0 points in June 2025, up 0.7 points (0.5 percent) from May. While the price indices for cereals and sugar decreased, they were outweighed by increases in the indices for dairy products, meat and vegetable oils. Overall, the FFPI was 7.0 points (5.8 percent) higher than its level in June 2024 but remained 32.2 points (20.1 percent) below its peak reached in March 2022.



The FAO Cereal Price Index averaged 107.4 points in June, down 1.6 points (1.5 percent) from May and 7.8 points (6.8 percent) below its value a year ago. Global maize prices fell sharply for the second consecutive month, as rising seasonal supplies in Argentina and Brazil intensified competition across major export origins. World prices of sorghum and barley also decreased in June. By contrast, despite harvest pressure from the northern hemisphere, international wheat prices increased month-onmonth, mostly reflecting weather concerns in some key producing areas, including the Russian Federation and parts of the European Union and the United States of America. The FAO All Rice Price Index fell by 0.8 percent, driven by weaker demand for Indica varieties.

The FAO Vegetable Oil Price Index averaged 155.7 points in June, up 3.5 points (2.3 percent) from the previous month and 18.2 percent above its June 2024 level. The increase mainly reflected higher prices for palm, rapeseed and soy oil, more than offsetting a slight decline in sunflower oil prices. International palm oil prices rose by nearly 5 percent in June, largely underpinned by strong global import demand amid increased price competitiveness. Soy oil prices also rose in June, influenced by expectations of higher feedstock demand from the biofuel sector following announcements of supportive policy measures in Brazil and the United States of America. Rapeseed oil prices were bolstered by expectations of continued tight global supplies in 2025/26. By contrast, global sunflower oil prices declined due to anticipation of increased production in the Black Sea region.

The FAO Meat Price Index averaged 126.0 points in June, rising 2.6 points (2.1 percent) from May and up 7.9 points (6.7 percent) from its value a year earlier, marking a new record high. The increase was driven by higher prices across all meat categories, except poultry. Global bovine meat prices reached a new peak, reflecting tighter export supplies from Brazil and strong demand from the United States of America, which exerted upward pressure on Australian export prices. Pig meat quotations rose due to firm global import demand amid stable supplies, while ovine meat prices increased sharply for the third consecutive month, supported by steady international demand and lower export availabilities from Oceania. By contrast, poultry meat prices continued to decline, pressured by ample domestic supplies in Brazil following the introduction of export restrictions after the detection of high pathogenicity avian influenza (HPAI) in mid-May. However, the impact was partly offset later in the

month, as Brazil's HPAI-free status was reinstated after a 28-day period without new outbreaks in commercial farms, leading some trading partners to ease restrictions and prompting a gradual recovery in import demand.

The FAO Dairy Price Index averaged 154.4 points in June, up 0.8 points (0.5 percent) from May and 26.5 points (20.7 percent) from its value a year ago. The butter price index recorded the largest monthly increase, rising by 2.8 percent to a new record of 225 points. The continued upward trend was mainly driven by persistent supply tightness in Oceania and the European Union, coupled with strong import demand from Asia, including the Near East. New Zealand entered its seasonal production slowdown, while in the European Union, herd contractions triggered by environmental regulations curbed milk production expansion, with some western regions further impacted by lingering impacts of the bluetongue virus outbreaks in late 2024. In the United States of America, lower monthly butter production and stocks falling below last year's levels added further pressure on prices. Cheese prices also rose for the third consecutive month, on continued solid retail and foodservice demand in East Asia. By contrast, skim milk powder prices edged down by 0.6 percent, while whole milk powder fell (2.3 percent) amid subdued demand and ample global supplies.

The FAO Sugar Price Index averaged 103.7 points in June, down 5.7 points (5.2 percent) from May, marking the fourth consecutive monthly decline and the lowest level since April 2021, when it averaged 100.0 points. The decline was mainly the result of improved supply prospects in key producing countries. In Brazil, after a slow start to the season, drier weather conditions accelerated harvesting and crushing which, together with a greater use of sugarcane to sugar production, resulting in higher-than-expected output in recent weeks and putting downward pressure on world sugar prices. Additionally, early and above-average monsoon rains, combined with expanded plantings in India and Thailand, improved crop prospects for the 2025/26 season, further contributing to the decline in global prices.

Türkiye Breaks Record in Agricultural Output, Enters World's Top 7

'According to World Bank data, our agricultural output rose from \$68.9 billion in 2023 to \$74 billion in 2024, a 7% increase,' says Agriculture and Forestry Minister



Türkiye's agricultural output reached a record high, rising from \$68.9 billion in 2023 to \$74 billion in 2024, a 7% increase that placed the country among the top seven in the world, the country's Agriculture and Forestry Minister announced. "Our agricultural production, which was \$68.9 billion in 2023, increased by 7% to \$74 billion in 2024, placing us among the top seven countries in the world," said Ibrahim Yumakli. "According to World Bank

data, our agricultural output rose from \$68.9 billion in 2023 to \$74 billion in 2024, a 7% increase. With this, we've entered the top seven countries globally. For the first time, our country has surpassed the \$70 billion mark," he added.

Turkish Construction Sector Takes on International Projects Worth \$6.2b In First Half of 2025

93 projects undertaken with average value of \$66.5M from January-July, according to Trade Ministry



The Turkish construction sector undertook international projects totaling \$6.2 billion in the first six months of 2025, according to data from the Trade Ministry, ranking among the top 10 countries in annual global construction revenue. Turkish constructors took on 93 international projects from January to the end of June, with an average project value of \$66.5 million.

The Trade Ministry data showed that the construction sector carried out 386 international projects in 2020, worth \$17.2 billion, followed by 459 projects with \$31.79 billion in 2021, 512 projects with \$20.1 billion in 2022, 445 projects with \$28.6 billion in 2023 and 378 projects with \$31.2 billion in 2024, at the height of the Russia–Ukraine War. The average value of international construction projects was \$69.3 million in 2021, \$39.2 million in 2022, \$64.2 million in 2023 and \$82.7 million in 2024. To date, Turkish constructors' projects abroad have hit 12,627 at \$543.6 billion in 137 countries since 1972.

The Turkish construction sector is most active in the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS), the Middle East and Africa. The CIS accounted for 43.2% of the Turkish construction business' international projects with \$235 billion, followed by the Middle East with 25.5% at \$138.5 billion and Africa with 17.9% at \$97 billion. The Turkish construction sector's projects in Europe totaled \$53.8 billion in value to date, while projects in the Asia-Pacific reached \$14.4 billion and projects in the Americas totaled \$4.6 billion. Turkish constructors' international projects were mostly in Russia, where the total project value reached \$103.1 billion to date, followed by Turkmenistan with \$54.2 billion, Iraq with \$36.6 billion, Saudi Arabia with \$33.4 billion, Libya with \$31.4 billion, Kazakhstan with \$29.6 billion, Algeria with \$23.2 billion, Azerbaijan with \$20.8 billion, Qatar with \$20.3 billion and the United Arab Emirates with \$18.8 billion. To date, road, tunnel and bridge projects accounted for 14.1% of the Turkish construction sector's international projects, while residential projects made up 13.4%, power plants stood for 8.5%, railway projects 7.1%, and commercial center projects 6.8%.

Turkish Auto Exports Reach Record High with Nearly \$20B in H1

Germany becomes largest buyer of Turkish autos in January-June period, accounting for \$3.2B



Türkiye's automotive sector achieved its highest exports at \$19.9 billion in the first six months of the year, according to data from the Turkish Exporters' Assembly (TIM). Auto exports rose 13% compared to the first half of last year, and these exports made up 15.2% of all Turkish exports. Türkiye's total exports rose 4.1% on an annual basis in the first half of the year, totaling \$131.4 billion, while rising 8% in June to \$20.5 billion.

17th International Defense Industry Fair Opens in Istanbul

6-day defense fair being held simultaneously at Istanbul Fair Center



The International Defense Industry Fair, one of the world's largest defense events, opened its doors in Istanbul, Türkiye. The 17th edition of the six-day defense fair is being held simultaneously in Istanbul.

This year's event features ministers, chiefs of staff, commanders, and top representatives from 103 countries, with stalls opening from 44 countries. The event hosts over 900 domestic and 400 international defense firms.

The exhibition's land vehicles section features main battle tanks, armored combat vehicles, electronic warfare systems, rockets and guided missiles,

tactical ballistic missiles, air defense missiles, and unmanned ground vehicles. Air vehicles include fixed-wing platforms, air defense systems, electronic warfare technologies, satellites, unmanned aerial vehicles, and aircraft engines. The fair's naval vehicles section includes combat and support ships, fixed-wing and rotary-wing platforms, unmanned surface and underwater vehicles, and command, control, and communication systems.
